In recent decades, men and masculinities have become an increasingly important topic in the interdisciplinary field of gender studies. Perhaps the most influential concept in this area is the notion of 'hegemonic masculinity' developed in the work of Raewyn Connell. Hegemonic forms of masculinity are closely related to economic and symbolic power; they subordinate other masculinities, and legitimize the subordination of women. But hegemony is always contested. Globalization, neoliberalism, and the making of precarious life change the politics of hegemony, and reframe social understandings of masculinity. Contemporary change calls for fresh empirical research and the rethinking of concepts.
